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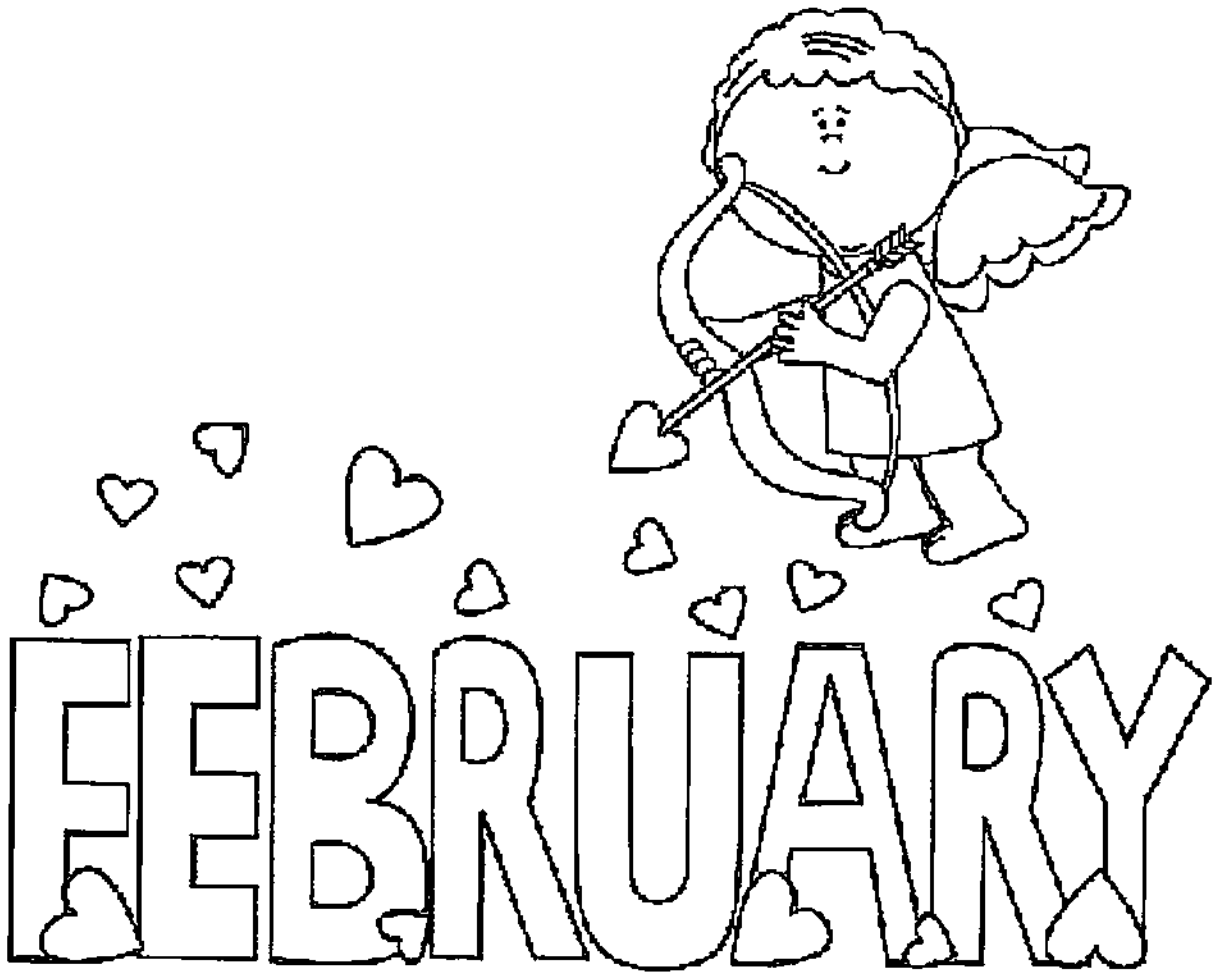

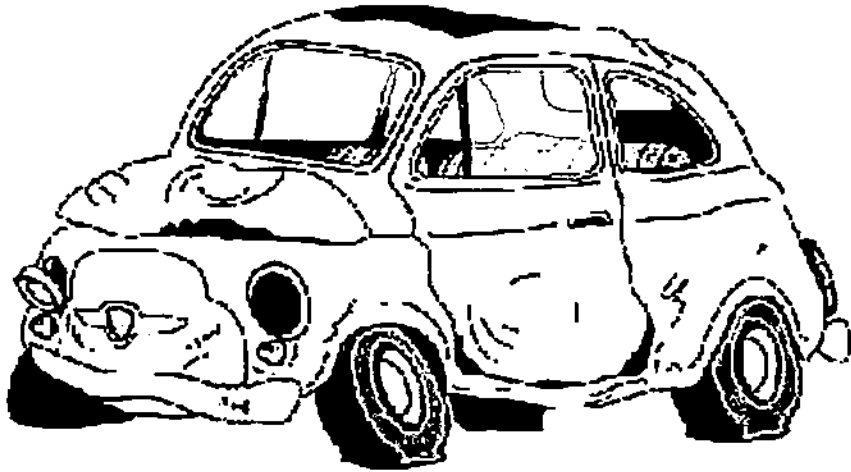

## **VEHICLES and PARKING**

1. All vehicles owned and or used by owners and or tenants within the community shall be registered with The Oaks Community Association.
2. Only motor vehicles as defined by the California Motor Vehicle Code shall be parked in a designated parking area on individual lots or community parking areas.
3. Vehicles that are inoperative or are not currently registered shall not be parked anywhere in the community visible from the street.
4. The speed limit for all vehicles in the community is 10 (ten) miles per hour.
5. Major repairs on vehicles, RVs, boats, etc., are not permitted within the community.
6. Trailers, campers, boats, etc., shall not be parked on a lot if visible from the street or from a neighbor's property.
7. Parking on the street in areas with curbs painted red is prohibited.
8. "Guest Parking" is intended for guests but may be available on a limited basis for the use of residents.
9. "Guest Parking" shall be limited to a maximum of only 1 parking space per household unless prior approval is granted.
10. Guest Parking shall not be used for longer than 72 hours without obtaining prior approval from the Association.
11. Parking in front of the mailboxes is limited to 15 minutes.
12. Parking spaces are color-coded as follows:
  - a. GREEN - Guest Parking
  - b. WHITE - Common Area Short-Term Parking

Please keep in mind that parking within the community is limited. Please be kind and obey the rules so that your neighbors and visitors can also have a place to park.

**Minutes of the Board of Directors Regular Meeting  
Tuesday, November 21, 2017 at 6:00PM**

**Call to Order:** Called to order at 6:00 PM.

**Pledge of Allegiance –** Was delivered.

**Roll Call of Directors:** Before taking roll call, President Brown announced Director Lacy had resigned her position on the Board and has moved from the community. He thanked Director Lacy for her time and commitment to the community. All other Board members were present with one vacancy on the Board due to Director Lacy's resignation.

**Approval of Minutes:** Minutes were approved as presented on a motion from Director Vescera and seconded by Director Hutson. Motion passed 6-0-0-1 with one Board position vacant. Approval of Executive Session Meeting Minutes of October 17th, 2017 – Minutes were passed as presented on a motion from Director Vescera and seconded by Treasurer Kaye. Motion passed 6-0-0-1 with one vacant Board position.

**Open Forum:** No comments submitted.

**Treasurer's Report:** The treasurer's report was delivered by Treasurer Kaye. She reported total cash on hand as \$329,191, net loss for the month of \$1,593 and net income YTD of \$1,132.

**Maintenance Report:** President Brown reported on the progress of the repairs to the front walkway.

**Community Manager Report:** Delivered by Terri Bailey, Community Manager. Terri reported she had not ordered the mailboxes yet and asked the Board if they wanted to reconsider purchasing the new mailboxes all at one time rather than piece-meal. On a motion from Director Hutson and seconded by Director Vescera, the Board approved purchasing all the mailboxes at a cost of approximately \$22,000.00. Motion passed 6-0-0-1, with one vacant Board position. She reported the newsletter would be changing in January of 2018 and also reported a workshop for a USDA grant/loan program would be held at the clubhouse on December 7<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 PM. The Community Manager asked if the Board intended to hold a December meeting. After some discussion they decided to cancel the Board meeting for December.

**Design Review:** A design review for lot 88 was rejected. The Board believed the paint color was too bright and wasn't on the list of acceptable colors.

**Discussion and Possible Action Regarding Reserve Study:** Motion to approve the reserve study as presented was made by Director Vescera and seconded by Director Hutson. Motion passed 6-0-0-1.

**Discussion and Possible Action Related to approval of a Volunteer Policy:** A motion to approve the volunteer policy as presented was made by Director Hutson and seconded by Director Six. Motion passed 6-0-0-1 with one vacant Board position.

**Discussion and Possible Action Related to Volunteers Providing Labor to Repair Signage and Repair to Curbs:** After some discussion the Board generally agreed with the proposal and approved the member going forward with their plans.

**Discussion and Possible Action related to Painting the Clubhouse and Landscaping Front of Clubhouse:** There was general agreement on the Board. A motion was made by Director Hutson to purchase mailboxes to replace all the current mailboxes and seconded by Treasurer Kaye. Motion passed 6-0-0-1 with one vacant Board position.

There was general Board discussion related to painting the clubhouse and landscaping the front of the clubhouse. The Board directed the community manager to seek input from the membership by asking them to vote on the color choice. A motion was made by Treasurer Kaye to put a concerted effort into sprucing up the appearance of the community. Motion was seconded by Director Hutson. Motion passed 6-0-0-1 with one vacant Board position.

**Discussion and Possible Action Related to Placing an Item on the Ballot to Convert to a 55 and Over Community: (Reconsideration)** – Director Vescera made a motion to not place this item on the ballot. Motion was seconded by Director Six. Motion passed 4-1-0-1 with Director Kaye voting against the motion and one vacant Board position.

**Discussion and Possible Action Related to Resolutions Establishing HOA Dues, Water Rates, Sewer Rates and various fees and charges for the 2018 Budget Year:** Motion to approve the resolutions as presented made by Director Hutson and seconded by Director Morrison. Motion passed 6-0-0-1 with one vacant Board position.

**Discussion and Possible Action related to Appointment of Election Inspectors:** The Board gave authority to Community Manager Bailey, to seek out and appoint election inspectors, as no one had applied for the positions yet.

**Social Committee:** Director Vescera reported that bingo would start again sometime after the new year.

**The Board adjourned at 6:58 PM.**

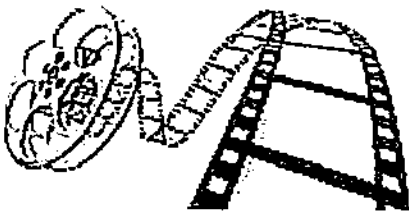
## *Movies and Things*

## B12 for your brain

The super vitamin B12 is a multitasker. It helps regulate how you feel, how well you think, and even appetite.

Vitamin B12 is known to help the brain produce chemicals such as serotonin and dopamine, which regulate mood and anxiety.

When people don't have enough B12 they experience symptoms such as fatigue, mouth or tongue soreness, constipation and a loss of appetite. They may be confused, have poor memory or feel depressed.

Although certain cereals and breads are often fortified with B12, animal proteins are really the only natural sources. The Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommends 2.4 mcg of B12 daily through three ounces of beef or three cups of milk.

Foods rich in B12 include liver, meat, eggs, poultry, shellfish, milk and milk products such as cheese and yogurt.

The stomach acid needed to absorb B12 declines with age, disease and behavior. Heavy drinking or even potassium supplements block absorption. Diseases such as celiac and Crohn's may render people unable to absorb adequate B12 from food.

## What is a financial caregiver?

As people age, it is not uncommon for them to need extra medical supervision as well as help with day-to-day tasks around the house to keep their standard of living.

One area of care that doesn't always get the most attention is finances. According to USA Today about 92 percent of caregivers are having to take on the responsibility of managing bank accounts, insurance claims, taxes, and investments. Also, these same caregivers are spending \$190 billion out of their own pockets each year to help provide financial stability to their loved ones in cases where their needs exceed their means.

As family members approach the time when they will need extra support, it will be beneficial to start planning early for issues that will likely come up. Long-term care insurance, for instance, is usually only an option when a person is still healthy, and it can provide more opportunities for care once things become more difficult.

Likewise, many continuing care retirement communities offer ways to ensure proper care over many years, but they often require the person to move in before they start having significant issues develop. In both of these cases, a lack of planning can lead to more substantial costs and an inability for the

care recipient to live where they want to.

As mentioned, financial caregivers often end up entirely managing the finances of their loved one, and this will usually require navigating insurance products that they might not be familiar with personally. Finding resources on how things work at an individual's state and local level can be challenging and it is useful to be able to reach out to people that are in a similar situation to find a support system for information sharing. While not all financial advisers are equipped to deal with these kinds of cases, it is possible to find a willing and knowledgeable agent to help at least keep the financial boat afloat for as long as necessary.

At the other end of the spectrum, individuals that are wondering whether or not they might need help in the future should be acting sooner rather than later. U.S. News recommends considering the legal process necessary to create powers of attorney for financial and medical decisions that make sense for everyone involved. In these cases, trust is the most important thing to consider as giving another person complete control over one's financial life could open the door for mishandling or outright abuse. In some cases, a trusted financial advisor can be employed to help watch over the big picture to ensure that family members are not acting selfishly.

## Depression: A major risk factor for heart patients

The leading risk factor for death within five years of a coronary artery diagnosis is depression.

The conclusion was part of a study published in the August 2017 issue of European Heart Journal Quality of Care and Outcomes.


Researchers found that in patients with significant coronary artery disease depressed patients have double the risk of death than patients who were not depressed.

To stretch between the shoulder blades, start by sitting up straight.

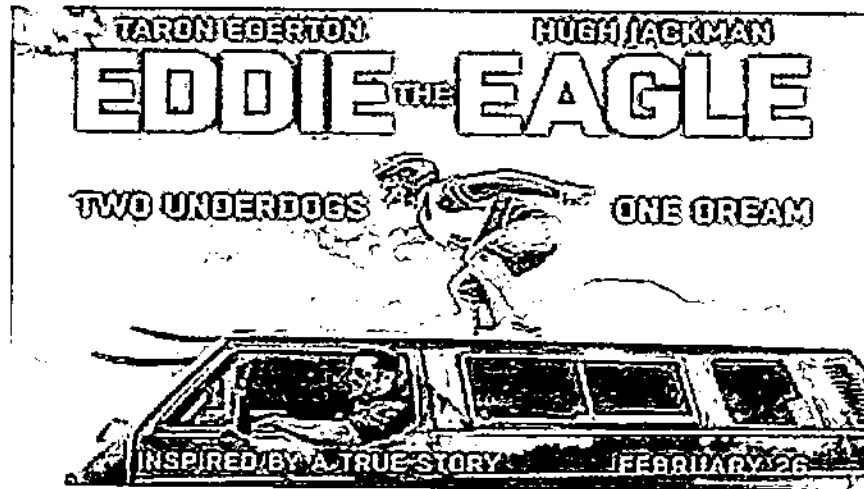

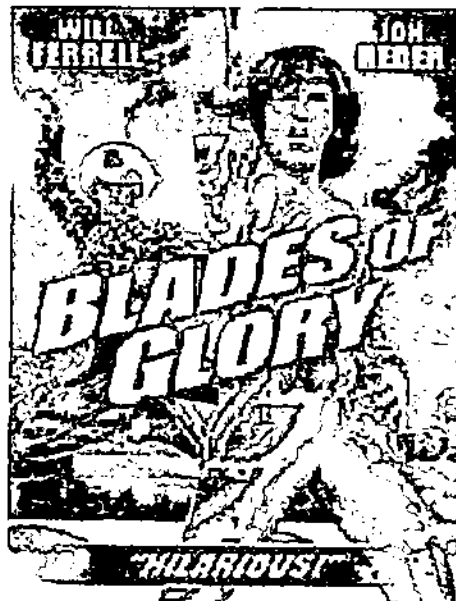
