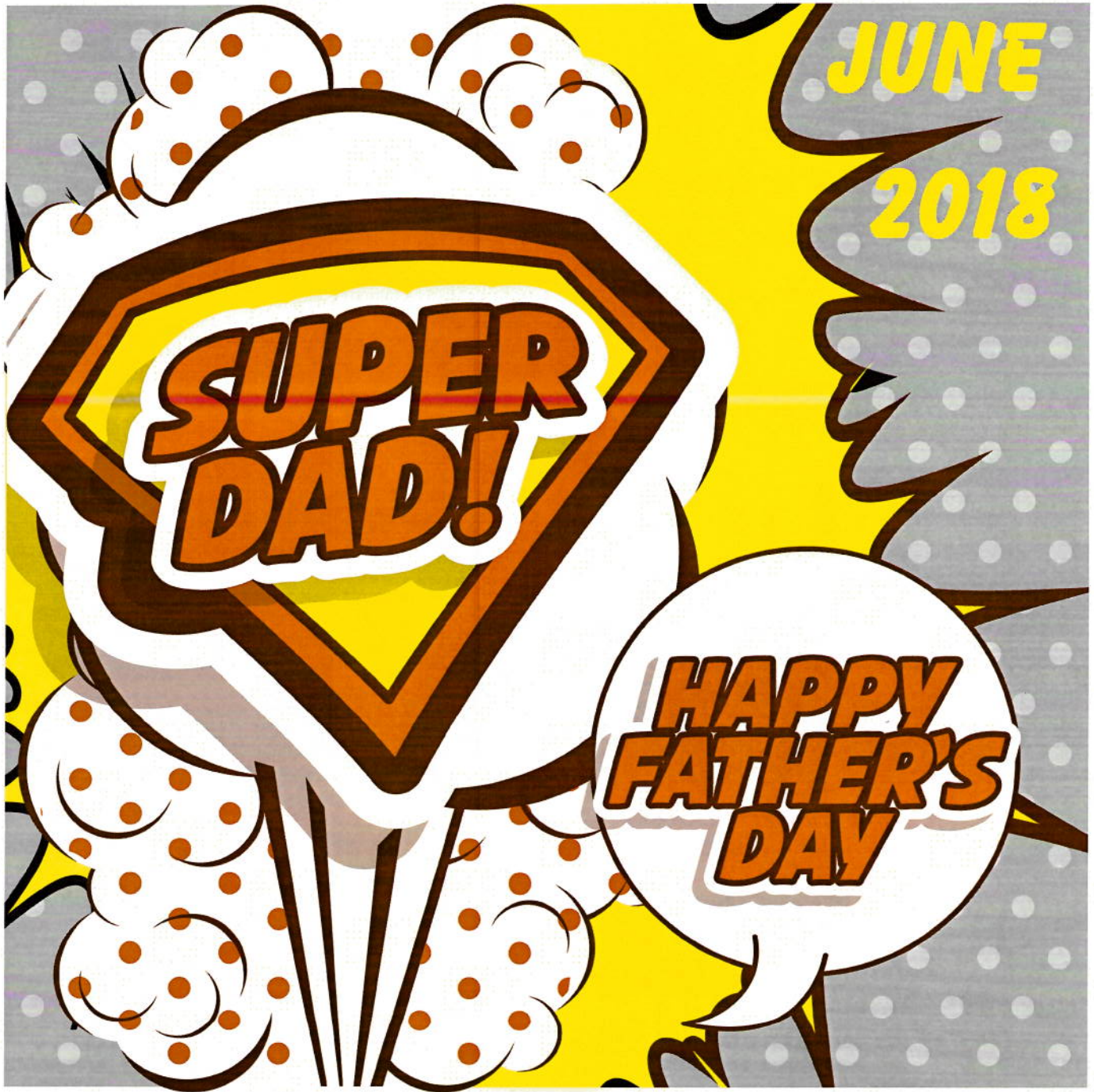


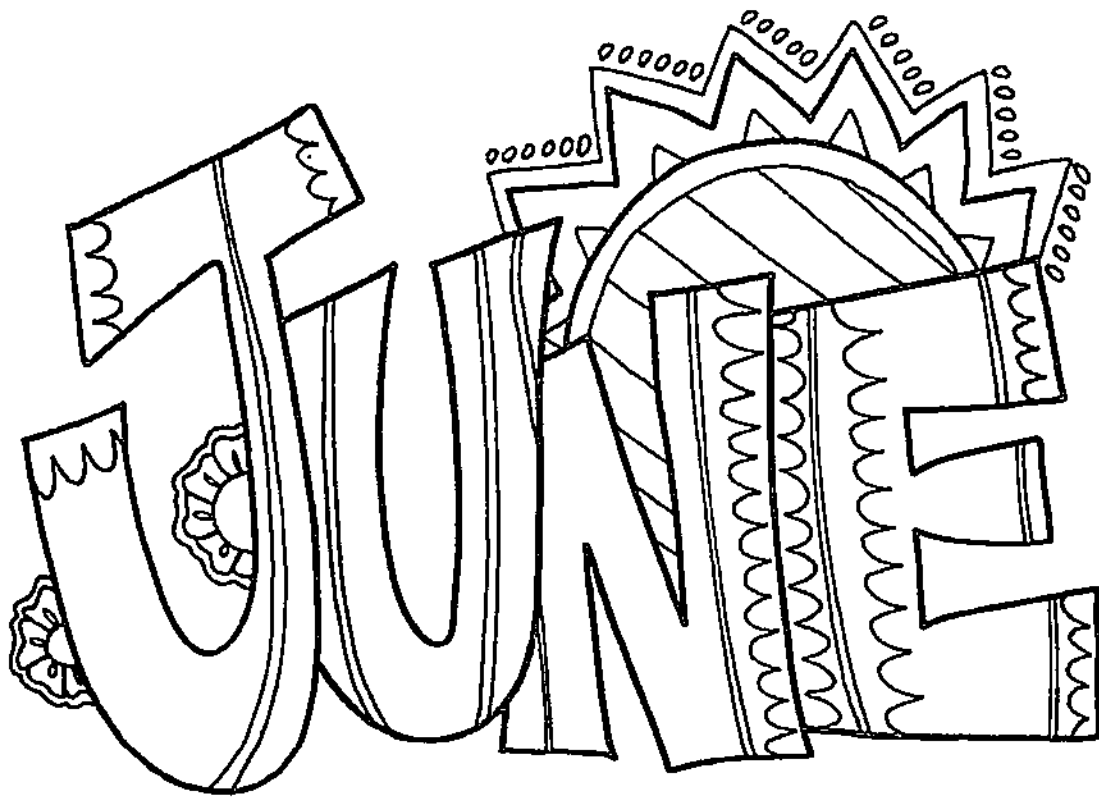

Members may address issues during the open forum portion of the meeting. If attendees become disruptive, they may be expelled from the meeting, and the Sheriff called.

Recording Meetings: Regular Meetings of the Board of Directors are recorded for record keeping purposes. The meetings are not a public meeting, and any recording of the meeting must be approved by the board beforehand.

Draft Minutes of Board of Directors Regular Meeting

Tuesday, April 17, 2018, at 6:00 PM

Type of Meeting: Regular Meeting:

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by President Brown at 6:01.

Pledge of Allegiance: The Pledge of Allegiance was delivered.

Roll Call of Directors: All Directors were present for the meeting.

Approval of Minutes: Approval of Regular Board of Directors Meeting Minutes of March 20, 2018. On a motion from Director Hutson, seconded by Director Six the minutes were approved as presented on a 6-0-0-1 vote, with Director S. Brown abstaining.

Approval of Special Board of Directors Meeting April 4, 2018. On a motion from Director S. Brown, seconded by Director Hutson the minutes were approved as presented. Motion passed 7-0-0

Open Forum: Director S. Brown stated that the open forum is to discuss items that are for the good of the community and not to lodge complaints about board members or members of the community.

A member asked if Director S. Brown was a Director. A member stated that the current board members should resign because none of them were in good standing. Director S. Brown stated that the open forum was for the good of the community. A member asked who was responsible for maintaining fire hydrants. A member stated she had almost ran over a little boy at the mailboxes and advised everyone to look both ways before backing up. A member asked the board if they believed that landscaping included cement. Director Calhoun reported a meeting to plan the community yard sale was scheduled for Monday, May 7th.

Treasurers Report: The Treasurers Report was delivered by Treasurer Strickland. It was reported cash on hand \$294,860, Accounts Receivable \$57,876, Net loss for the month \$3,489, Net loss YTD \$7,279.

Maintenance Report: The Maintenance Report was delivered by Director Morrison. It was reported that the front door would not lock one night, and a locksmith had to be called. The problem with the door was that bees had nested in the door causing the lock to not engage. He reported that the security vehicle is not operational as a valve had come through the engine. He recommended that a new vehicle be purchased because the current one was not worth repairing. The board appointed a committee of Director S. Brown and Director Strickland to research purchasing a new vehicle.

Community Manager Report: The Community Manager Report was delivered by Terri Bailey. She restated the concern from a member related to children around the mailboxes. She asked the board permission to purchase concave mirrors to allow drivers a better view when backing up their vehicles at the mailboxes. The board approved purchasing two concave mirrors. Brady McCartney was introduced as the new, certified wastewater operator. He spoke to the needs and requirements to update the wastewater facility to meet standards of the State Water Resource Control Board. He informed the board that there were state grants available to cover the cost of the updates and he provided the community manager with contact information to obtain the grants. The Board directed the community manager to include as a future agenda item the status of the wastewater facility.

Design Review: A design review for lot 65 was considered. The design review requested that a palm tree be removed, and concrete be poured in the front yard to allow for additional parking. The board requested that this item be tabled until the next board meeting to allow board members time to further review the request.

Discussion and Possible Action Related to the Buena Vista Casino: Director S. Brown read a letter to Amador County Regarding Intergovernmental Service Agreement between Amador County and the Buena Vista Casino. On a motion from Director Hutson, seconded by Director Six the board agreed to send the letter as presented. Motion passed 7-0-0.

Discussion and possible Action Related to Update of Phone System: No Action was taken.

Discussion and Possible Action Related to Gate at Fishing Pond: The community manager stated that she had already taken action to provide locks at the fishing pond. The new lock would be keyed to use the same key as the pool. No action was taken by the board.

Discussion and Possible Action Related to Special Members Meeting June 18, 2018: Set special meeting date for members hearing to determine member's standing. The board directed the community manager to set the hearing date for Tuesday, May 8, 2018, at 5:00 PM.

Future Agenda Items: This is not an action item. No items were requested as future agenda items.

Adjourn: The board adjourned into executive session at 8:05.

Question of the Month:

I was recently asked if the Davis-Stirling Act had any provision limiting the number or percentage of rental property in a Community Interest Development.

The short answer is no. There is no limitation in the Davis-Stirling Act regarding the number of rental properties allowed in a Common Interest Development (or Homeowners Association).

The Davis-Stirling Act does provide a mechanism for communities to ask the membership to vote to change the Bylaws to restrict the number or percentage of rental property allowed.

The communities that have enacted such provision have a difficult time enforcing this requirement.

Some communities rather than restrict the number or percent of rental properties have passed requirement that require persons who purchase properties in the community to live in the home for a certain amount of time before they can convert the property to rental property. Many mortgages have a similar stipulation.

Voting Instruction and Notice of Special Members Meeting and Election for Removal of Directors June 18th 6:00 PM

A petition was served on the board of directors which called for a special membership meeting for the purpose of removal of several members of the board of directors. The petition named five or the seven board members for removal. The directors named in the petition are; Rickie Brown, Ann Hutson, Bill Six, Dean Morrison and Dana Calhoun.

As provided by in section 5.4 of the Bylaws, members who are currently in "good standing" have the opportunity to vote to either remove or retain members of the Board of Directors.

On the ballot you may select, either yes or no for each of the five directors named in the original petition for removal.

Next to each of the director's name will be boxes with yes or no to be marked. If you select yes, you are voting to remove that director from the board. If you select no, you are voting to retain that director on the board.

For your vote to count, you must follow the voting instructions as outlined by the Davis-Stirling Act and the Voting Rules approved by The Association Board of Directors. The instructions include; selecting from the official ballot, either yes or no for each one of the five directors.

You must also complete the required information in the upper left-hand corner of the envelope marked with the #2.

After you mark your ballot, place the Official Ballot inside the small envelope marked Official Ballot Envelope. Place the Official Ballot Envelope inside the envelope marked #2. Complete the information in the upper left-hand corner of the envelope marked #2 and place both envelopes in the envelope addressed to "Goin' Postal." You can mail the envelope containing the Official Ballot Envelope. You may also drop off the envelope at, "Goin' Postal" located at 11310 Prospect Drive, Jackson, CA. Or, you can place the envelope addressed to "Goin Postal" in the ballot box located in the clubhouse.

If you mail the envelope, please allow enough time for mail delivery. The mailed envelopes will be picked up from the Personal Mail Box at "Goin' Postal" by the Election Inspector on Monday, June 18th 2018 after 5:01 PM.

Ballots dropped off at the clubhouse must be deposited into the official ballot box and must be received before 6:00 PM on Monday, June 18th, 2018. If ballots are received after 6:00 they may be rejected by the Election Inspector as being late.

The Membership meeting will be called to order at 6:00 PM Monday, June 18th, 2018. Once the meeting is called to order, and after the open forum, the Election Inspector will determine if a quorum has been met by counting the number of ballots returned. If a quorum has been achieved the Election Inspectors will then begin opening and counting the ballots.

Any requests for replacement ballots will only be authorized at the discretion of the Election Inspector.

Notice of Proposed Rule Change

Civil Code Section 4360(a) states; The board shall provide general notice pursuant to **Section 4045** of a proposed rule change at least 30 days before making the rule change. The notice shall include the text of the proposed rule change and a description of the purpose and effect of the proposed rule change. Notice is not required under this subdivision if the board determines that an immediate rule change is necessary to address an imminent threat to public health or safety or imminent risk of substantial economic loss to the association.

The Board of Directors of The Oaks Community Association will be considering adoption of proposed rule changes during their regularly scheduled board meeting in June.

INTRODUCTION

The "Rules and Regulations" have been created and adopted by the Oaks Community Association to ensure a safe, comfortable living environment for the residents of The Oaks. Nothing in these "Rules and Regulations" is intended to conflict with applicable State or local enactments or the provisions of the Association's Governing Documents (CC&Rs).

These "Rules and Regulations apply to all lot owners, residents, and guests, and may be amended and modified from time to time by the Board of Directors of the Association. These rules are not intended to be all-inclusive. Matters not covered herein shall be handled at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Proposed Rules changes will be addressed at the June Board of Directors meeting. One the board determines changes to the rules and regulations the proposed changes and the effect of the proposed changes will be posted and a hard copy will be available for review in the office. The proposed changes will also be posted on the community website, theoakscommunityassociation.org.
